Craig laid the groundwork for establishing some raised beds, and we can move forward with this if/when our move becomes a reality. Of course, when that time comes, we will need some dedicated volunteers to help get the new plots ready for planting in 2020. Our success depends of the support of our volunteers and the strength of our gardening community.

In the coming season, we are looking forward to renewing our garden friendships and welcoming new gardeners to our community. So, let's set our sights on sunshine and warm weather!

2019 REGISTRATION

This year, we will have in-person registration on **April 13**, at 9:30 **AM**, in the upstairs Rotary Room of the Dwight Foster Public Library. This is a time to request your plot, share gardening tips, suggest workshop ideas, choose your volunteer chores and socialize with fellow gardeners.

Please note that there has been a change in our registrations process. Last season we received several suggestions on how to improve the running and upkeep of the gardens. This year, we are implementing a *refundable* maintenance fee of \$10.00. It has always been the responsibility of each gardener to maintain their plot and immediate surrounds, keeping it weed-free and harvesting produce in a timely way. This not only gives the neighborhood a pleasing visual, but makes our fall cleanup an easy routine. Plots are monitored throughout the season, and reminder notices are sent to gardeners whose plots are overgrown and neglected. Unfortunately, over the past several years, there have been enough neglected and abandoned plots to cause comment, and the cleanup responsibility has fallen to the few gardeners that attend our fall cleanup. In order to avoid this, we are asking a maintenance fee, up front, of \$10.00, in cash. [For accounting purposes, this must be kept separate from your registration fees & donations.] If, at the end of the season, your plot has been maintained and readied for winter, your fee will be refunded. However, if your plot has become neglected and you have received warnings, you will forfeit this fee.

The 2019 registration forms are attached. Please complete both forms and submit them with your payment. We hope you will attend the meeting on April 13, but if you cannot, you may send your registration forms in. *Please note, that if your forms are mailed in, you will then need to make a separate time to meet with Deborah in person*.

ATTENTION ALL GARDENERS !!!

New Volunteer Opportunity Available

We are looking for a volunteer to assist Deborah with coordinating the running of the gardens. Duties of the co-coordinator will be more 'hands on' rather than administrative & organizational. The co-coordinator tasks include: supporting gardeners in their volunteer tasks (storage shed, kiosk, compost, water, mowing, etc), serving as a backup to Deborah for plot registrations and gardener communications, and managing un-rented or abandoned plots. Likely time commitment is roughly 2-4 hours per week in April and October, with about one hour per week during the months in between.
